The requirement to submit a formal Risk Assessment to a vessels Flag State when navigating primarily on an ECDIS no longer exists, however MGN 285 strongly recommends a Risk Assessment is conducted. COURSE CANDIDATES

The ECDIS Risk Assessment is applicable to all Officers of the Watch including the Captain.

It will be fundamental that the Officer responsible for the maintenance of the ECDIS is available, however not all Officers will be required at all times.

OUTCOME

Once the ECDIS Risk Assessment is complete, all Officers of the Watch will have a better understanding of the procedures necessary on-board as well as increased confidence in using the equipment.
